#### 1. P1 Applications for September 2023 & the importance of supporting local schools

The next academic year, 2023-24, will reflect a low birth year, meaning that there are fewer children of pre-school age needing P1 places. As a small city school, we feel the pinch of this more than most. We currently have only 12 applications for P1 in September, 6 less than the current P1 class. This reduction in numbers will be made worse by the fact that a large class of 26 P7s will be leaving us in June. A smaller number of pupils will mean a smaller school budget. A smaller school budget will mean less money to spend on employing staff, books, after-school activities and developing things, such as outdoor play areas. Most of what parents see in the Key Stage One playground and our new Family Resource Centre for example, was obtained through external funding from charitable organisations.

Our school enrolment is also affected by other factors such as changing demographics in this part of South-East Belfast and more and more parents choosing "integrated" primary schools over Controlled primary schools (such as Cregagh Primary, which has always been organically integrated and welcomes and cherishes children from all backgrounds), as they feel doing so better positions their children to obtain a place in an integrated secondary school. The shortage of housing for young families in our immediate area is yet another factor that is adding pressure to our school enrolment. Average family size has also fallen significantly across the UK in recent decades. Additionally, Cregagh Primary is surrounded by other primary schools (maintained, controlled, and integrated) – all competing for an ever-decreasing number of children.

In short, our school will need to see a significant upturn in P1 enrolment over the next few years if it is to stay in 'good health'. It is essential therefore, that our local community gets behind our school in every way it can and does whatever it can to encourage future generations of children from the estate and also the wider Cregagh area to attend Cregagh Primary School. As current principal, former Vice-Principal and teacher, and former P1-7 pupil of this school, I am passionate to see it flourish and thrive. All my staff are equally committed to this vision. Ultimately however, the future of our lovely school won't be decided solely by its staff and governors; the community that our tagline speaks of: "A family of learning at the heart of our community", has an equally big part to play.

#### 2. World Book Day - Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> March

World Book Day is a charity event held annually in the United Kingdom and Ireland on the first Thursday in March. On World Book Day, every child in full-time education in the UK is given a voucher to be spent on books; the event was first celebrated in the United Kingdom in 1998.

As in past years, our pupils are being encouraged to enter into the spirit of WBD by dressing up as their favourite book character. School asks for a voluntary donation of £1 per family (rather than per child ... cost of living etc) which will be used to purchase new library books for the children. Special thanks to Mr Irwin and the PTA for organising the sale of pre-loved children's costumes on Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> February. I hope some of you managed to grab yourselves a £2 bargain!

#### 3. Short Course for Parents starting Wednesday 1st March
